TURKISH CYPRIOT CHILDREN RETURN TO LEFKA SECONDARY SCHOOL WITH UNFICYP ESCORT

ABOUT 200 school children from the Turkish Cypriot communities of Limnitis, Ghaziveran, Angolemi, Elea, Kalokhorio and Ambelikou have returned to Lefka, under UNFICYP escort, to attend the secondary school there for the first time since December 1963.

Arrangements with the local Cyprus authorities for the passage of the students were completed on Saturday, 14 November.

The matter had been raised in the **Aide-Memoire** which Mr. Carlos A. Bernardes, Special Representative of the Secretary-General, sent to His Beatitude, Archbishop Makarios, President of the Republic, on 27 October, and to which the President responded in his letter given to Mr. Bernardes when, together with General K. S. Thimayya, UN Force Commander, he visited the President on Thursday, 12 November.

On Saturday, 14 November, Police Superintendent Odysseas Lambrou in Morphou informed the UNFICYP Paphos Zone Command that he had received instructions from Nicosia to allow freedom of movement for the Turkish Cypriot students in the area to enable them to resume their secondary school studies in Lefka.

On receipt of this information, Colonel C. G. Stahl, UNFICYP Paphos Zone Commander, advised the Turkish Cypriot leaders of the localities concerned and assisted in making arrangements to move the children, under UNFICYP escort.

Sunday morning, 15 November, UNFICYP units of the Swedish contingent in Paphos Zone began gathering students from the different villages in private buses and escorted them to Lefka. The operation was concluded at about 1300 hours.

Under present plans, UNFICYP will escort students to Lefka and back to their communities every week-end. During school days, they will board at Lefka.

GOVERNMENT AUTHORIZES ENTRY OF RED CRESCENT SUPPLIES FOR TURKISH CYPRIOT REFUGES

HIS Beatitude, Archbishop Makarios, President of the Republic, has responded favourably to an appeal which was made by UNFICYP to allow the entry of a Red Crescent shipment of food, blankets and clothing from Turkey for Turkish Cypriot refugees.

In addition to freedom of movement for the school children in the area, Turkish Cypriot teachers are also allowed now to go to their schools outside Lefka, and miners from the district may go to the mines within the Lefka area.

The President's agreement was contained in a letter addressed to Mr. Carlos A. Bernardes which was handed to the Special Representative of the Secretary-General when, with General K.S. Thimayya, UN Force Commander in Cyprus, he called on the President on Thursday evening, 12 November.

The appeal was addressed to the President by Mr. Bernardes on 30 October.

In his response to the Special Representative, the President pointed out that the Government has allowed such shipments to enter the country in the past without restriction and free of duty. The President added that in spite of the economic problems involved by authorizing such shipments, the Government had decided to allow, as an exception, the shipment of the Red Crescent supplies to be brought in without delay and exempt from duty.

It is expected that the shipment of the Turkish Red Crescent Society will arrive at MAGUSTA shortly.

Rotation of the Danish Contingent with UNFICYP Begins

THE rotation of the Danish contingent with the United Nations Force in Cyprus began on Friday, 13 November, with the arrival of the first group of officers and soldiers from Denmark aboard a Britania aircraft of the RAF Transport Command at 23.05 hours.

A total of about 870 officers and men will be rotated within ten days and rotation will be completed by the morning of 23 November. Two Britania aircraft, each making five round trips, are being used.

The Danish contingent leaving, arrived in Cyprus in May. It is the last of the original contingents which arrived in Cyprus when UNFICYP was constituted.

THE UNITED NATIONS
AT WORK

(Part 4)

LATE in 1962, the situation in the Caribbean region, which had been brought before the Security Council and the General Assembly on repeated occasions, entered a new and more critical stage. Three complaints were put before the Council:

The United States asked that the Council meet "to deal with the serious threat to the peace and security of the world caused by the secret establishment in Cuba by the Soviet Union of launching bases and installation of long-range ballistic missiles capable of carrying thermonuclear warheads to most of North and South America." The United States announced that it was initiating a strict quarantine of Cuba to interdict the carriage of offensive weapons to that country.

Cuba requested that the Security Council consider "the act of war unilaterally committed by the Government of the United States in ordering the naval blockade of Cuba," and said that this "unilateral and direct aggression" was the culmination of "a series of aggressive acts committed against the Revolutionary Government of Cuba and the Cuban people" by the Government of the United States.

The Soviet Union asked the Council to examine the question of "Violation of the Charter of the United Nations and threat to the peace on the part of the United States of America."

A Soviet statement asserted that the United States, in arrogating to itself the right to attack the vessels of other states on the high seas, was "taking a step toward the unleashing of a world thermonuclear war."

The Security Council met on October 23. U Thant, then Acting Secretary-General, told members the following day that, at the request of a large majority of member states, he had sent identical messages to the President of the United

States and to the Chairman of the Council of Ministers of the Soviet Union, asking for steps to resolve the crisis.

These steps included, on the one hand, the voluntary suspension of all arms shipments to Cuba, and also the voluntary suspension of the quarantine measures involving the searching of ships bound for Cuba. Such a suspension for a period of two to three weeks would greatly ease the situation, he said, and give time to the parties concerned to hold discussions with a view to finding a peaceful solution of the problem. He had also made an appeal to the President and the Prime Minister of Cuba to suspend the construction and development of major military facilities and installations in Cuba during the period of negotiations.

In December, in his speech at Johns Hopkins University, U Thant reviewed the situation.

"It became apparent in late October," he said, "that there was danger of a direct confrontation between the two major powers, and that every possible step should be taken to avert this confrontation. I gave expression to this feeling in the Security Council, by an odd coincidence on United Nations Day, and I addressed an appeal both on that day and on the next to the heads of the two governments, to which I received an encouraging and positive response from both quarters."

The next day, the Council was informed that President Kennedy and Chairman Khrushchev had sent replies welcoming U Thant's initiative, and the Council adjourned to await the results of the talks between representatives of the parties concerned with the Acting Secretary-General.

Regarding subsequent developments, he said that "in spite of periods when there seemed to be little progress, the negotiations advanced steadily to a point at which if now possible to report agreement on certain fundamentals between the two major powers."

Meanwhile, the Prime Minister of Cuba had replied that Cuba was prepared to accept the steps suggested by the Acting Secretary-General provided that, at the same time, while negotiations were in progress, the United States desisted from threats and aggressive actions against Cuba, including the naval blockade.

And he added:

"There may be many who wish for a more complete and comprehensive solution of the Cuban crisis, but in this imperfect world we have, at least for the moment, to accept less than perfect solutions."

UNITED NATIONS NEWS

THE SECRETARY-GENERAL

THE Secretary-General U Thant, has invited Mr. Harold Wilson, Britain's Prime Minister, to lunch on 9 December. Mr. Wilson has accepted and the details of his visit are expected to be announced shortly.

The Secretary-General has informed the Security Council that the Mission of his Special Representative to Cambodia and Thailand will be withdrawn by the end of the year. At the same time, he reported that Thailand had suggested that consideration be given to other ways in which the UN Secretariat might still be able to render aid towards the normalization of relations between the two countries. In particular, Thailand suggested that a high-ranking member of the Secretariat might be sent on special missions to the area at certain appropriate times to talk with the leaders of the two countries and to suggest appropriate measures.

The Secretary-General said that the Cambodian Government had agreed to the suggestion while expressing some doubts as to the results that might be expected from such mediation attempts.

U Thant said that he had informed the two governments that he would contact them on the matter at some suitable time during 1965.

THE DECOLONIZATION COMMITTEE

ON 11 November the Decolonization Committee approved the report which concluded that the activities of the mining industry and other international interests in South-West Africa constituted one of the main obstacles to the territory's development towards independence.

The report strongly recommended that the General Assembly strongly condemn South Africa for granting concessions to international companies for exploiting the natural and human resources of the territory to the detriment of the African population. It said that South Africa should be called upon to end the activities of the companies and to safeguard the sovereignty of the people over the territory's natural resources.

The report also recommended that the General Assembly appeal to all States whose nationals had

argued, rightly spoke out against specific activities which had clearly been shown to be detrimental to the rights and interests of the people of South-West Africa. These two countries argued further that condemnations of apartheid were not enough, and that it was necessary to take specific measures to bring about its abandonment.

COMMITTEE ON OUTER SPACE

THE Soviet Union and the United States have agreed, at United Nations Headquarters, to set up a special communications link between Moscow and Washington for the exchange of weather information gathered by conventional means as well as by satellites.

Other recommendations included a renewed call to South Africa to end its policies of apartheid in South-West Africa, a request for the application of more decisive economic and political sanctions against South Africa, and the taking of all possible measures towards the earliest attainment of independence by South-West Africa.

The report as a whole was approved by a vote of 16 in favour, to 4 against, with 4 abstentions. Those voting in favour were all Africa-Asian and East European members of the Committee. Britain, the United States, Australia and Italy voted against. Uruguay, Venezuela, Chile and Denmark abstained. All States which voted against or abstained emphasized that they joined in condemning South Africa's racial policies, but that they raised objections to the report's conclusions and recommendations mainly on the following grounds:

That the conclusions about the activities of the international companies were not fully justified by the facts, and that the report implied that the system of foreign private investment was largely responsible for conditions in South-West Africa.

That there was no justification for the specific references to Britain and the United States — these two countries commented that they had no authority over the activities of the private interests concerned.

Ethiopia and Tanzania — who were among the members who drew up the report — emphasized that the report was not against foreign private investments, as such, and that they welcomed such investment when it was mutually profitable. The report, they

On 3 November, Brazil informed the Committee that it was establishing launching

facilities for sounding rockets near Natal, in North-Eastern Brazil, and would request United Nations sponsorship for them when arrangements were completed. Speaking for Brazil, Geraldo de Carvalho Silos pointed out that the geomagnetic equator passed through that area, and the finding of launching facilities at Natal could be of the utmost interest to all member states engaged in space research.

The Committee already has before it a recommendation from its Scientific and Technical Sub-committee that UN sponsorship be granted to sounding rocket launching facilities at Thumba, India.

ADEN

THE United Nations Sub-Committee on Aden has recommended that steps be taken to carry out UN resolutions calling for unsupervised elections to determine the future of Aden and Aden Protectorates.

The sub-committee emphasized that "the state of emergency must be terminated, that military operations must cease, that the political rights and freedoms of all inhabitants of the territory must stop". It recommended that Britain be asked not to give effect to the conclusions of the London Conference held last summer on the Constitutional Development of the Federation of South Arabia, and that it be asked to comply with the wishes of the people and the recommendations of the General Assembly on the desirability of an early removal of the military base in Aden.

The sub-committee further recommended that, if the present situation continued, it should again be drawn to the attention of the Security Council.

These recommendations are contained in a report of the sub-committee made public on 7th November. The report will be considered by the Decolonization Committee.

The report challenges the validity of the London Conference on the grounds that not all sections of the Aden population were represented there. It also comments that elections held in Aden last month "have been very hotly contested because, on one hand, electoral law is restrictive in the extreme and, on the other hand, the state of emergency and the restrictions placed on fundamental freedoms remain in effect in the territory."

The Sub-Committee on Aden is made up of representatives from Cambodia, Iraq, the Ivory Coast, Venezuela and Yugoslavia.

NEWS IN FINNISH

YK:N KULUNEEN VUODEN
TOIMINTAA.

Jokainen vuosi Yhdistyneiden Kansakuntien toiminnassa on merkinnyt uusia aluevaltauksia ja toiminnan laajemista. Samalla nousee jatkuvasti uusia ongelmia ratkaistavaksi vanhojen tehtävien rinnalle.

YK:n alkuperäinen jäsenluku oli 52. Tällä hetkellä jäsenien näärä on 112. Yhdistyneiden Kansakuntien jäseneksi voidaan ottaa "jokainen rauhaa rakastava valtio, joka hyväksyy peruskirjaan sisältyvät velvoitteet ja on halukas ja kykenevä noudattamaan näitä velvoitteita.

Kuluvan vuoden tärkeimmät tehtävät ovat olleet aseistariisunta, siirtomaiden vapauttaminen ja kehitysapu. Tehtävien edistymistä on suuresti helpottanut idän ja lännen välisen jännityksen lieventyminen Moskovassa elokuussa 1963 allekirjoitetun ydinkoelto sopimuksen jälkeen.

"Aseistariisunnen toteuttaminen on jatkuvasti aikamme tärkein ongelma" totesi YK:n pääsihteeri äskettäin. Tämän päämäärän hyväksi on maailmanjärjestö vuosikausia työskennellyt. Vuoden 1963 aikana kirjattiin kolme huomattavaa

vaa tapahtumaa tällä rintamalla. Ensimmäinen oli suoran puhelinhyteyden, ns. kuuman linjan avaaminen Washingtonin ja Moskovan välille. Sitä seurasivat jo edellä mainittu Moskovan sopimus, jossa Neuvostoliitto, Iso-Britannia ja Yhdysvallat sitoutuivat pidättäytymään ilmakehässä, avaruudessa ja veden alla suoritettavista ydinvoikeista. Kolmanneksi sopivat Yhdysvallat ja Neuvostoliitto olemaan lähettämättä avaruuteen ydinaseita tai muita joukkotuhovälineitä. Useissa yhteyksissä on arveltu aseis tariisunnan johtavan taloudellisiin vaikeuksiin ja aiheuttavan esim. työttömyyttä. Tämä teoria on nyt osoitettu tieteilisesti paikkansapitämätömkäksi kun kymmenen valtion taloustieteilijät laativat raportin aseistariisunnan taloudellisista ja sosiaalisista seuraauksista.

Yhdistyneiden Kansakuntien erityisenä kohtena on ollut itsehallintoa vailla olevilla alueilla elävien ihmisten hyvinvointi. YK:n peruskirjan allekirjoittamisen jälkeen vuoden 1945 kesäkuussa on itsehallintoa vailla olevilla alueilla ja huoltohallintoalueilla elävien ihmisten lukumäärä väheni 215 miljoonasta alle 35 miljoonan.

DANSKARNA
ROTERAR

DEN DANSKA Cypern-bataljonen, DANCON I, boerjade rotera den 13 november Hemtransporten av DANCON I och hittransporten av DANCON II tar tio dagar. CYPERNS president, aerkbisop Makarios, har lamnat ett positivt svar paa en framställan fraan UNFICYP om tillataelse att islandfoera en skeppslast Roeda Halvmaanen-foernoedenheter fraan Turkiet, avsedda foer turkypriotiska flyktingar. Skeppslasten skall bestaa av livsmedel, filter och klaedespersedlar.

Framstallan gjordes den 30 oktober och svaret oeverlaemnades av president Makarios till generalsekreterare U Thants spec'elle representant senior Bernades vid ett besoek som denne avlaide hos presidenten i saellskap med chefen foer FN-styrkan paa Cypern general K.S. Thimayya paa kvaellen den 12 november.

I sitt svar paapekade presidenten, att regeringen tidigare laatit saadana saendningar infoeras i landet utan inskrankningar och avgifter. DANCON II bydes velkommen til det sommervarme Cypern.

Regntiden er udeblevet, og det skaber problemer for cyprioterne - Ingen daarlig ide at tilbringe vinteren paa Middelhavssø

Murene omkring Nicosias indre by blev bygget i 1567 af venetianerne. Med deres 400 aar paa bagen danner de kontrast til det liv og den trafik, som i dag finder sted paa og omkring dem. Paa nojagtigt samme maade vil man snart se, at Cypern er modsætningers ø - i mere end en forstand. Ingen er i tvil om, at grunden til at der er en FN-styrke paa Cypern er de stærke nationale og politiske modsætningsforhold.

Regnen vil naturligvis betyde flere problemer for FN-styrken. Det er ikke særligt spændende at skulle bestride en krevende vagtjeneste, naar regnen skyller ned. Og efter sigende er det saadan paa Cypern, at naar det regner, er det, som om Vorherre vender bunden i vejret paa en enorm balje vand. Det er naturligvis kun en ringe trost, at soldaterne fra DANCON I i samtlige seks maaneder har sukket efter vand. Bare en enkelt lille regnbyge paa et par døgn varighed ville have frisket op. Det er nemlig helt sikkert, at regnen vil faa

store dele af øen til at ændre karakter. I mere end et halvt aar har Cypern ligget skjult af store støvskyer, der hvrles op af trafikken paa de smaa veje. Landskabet kan mange steder virke saa ensformigt, at det uvilkaarligt fører tankerne hen paa et maanelandskab. Graat, brunt og rødligt dominere. Store knastørre marker, hvor faare- og gedeflokke græsser fredsommeligt, skønt vi næppe vil være i stand til at finde saa meget som et enkelt græsstraal.

Naar regnen engang kommer, vil der skyde planter op paa mange af disse graa og halvtriste steder. Saa bliver der meget at se paa, som soldaterne paa DANCON I aldrig naade at opleve. Nu skal man jo heller ikke tro, at hele Cypern ser ud som sletterne omkring Nicosia. Ved kysterne findes der mange frodige steder. I egen omkring Lissabon paa sydkysten gror appelsin- og grapefrugtræerne side om side i store plantager. Imellem planterne er der frodige vinmarker. I Trodosbjergene sydvest for Nicosia er det ogsaa de frodige vinmarker, der dominere landskabet, og enkelte steder paa sydkysten ser man ogsaa lunde med bananpalmer.

I løbet af faa dage har soldaterne paa DANCON II formentlig faaet akklimatiseret sig, og ingen vil da være i tvil om, at det egentlig slet ikke er nogen daarlig ide at tilbringe vinteren paa Cypern - den sommervarme Cypern - den sommervarme Middelhavssø.

sakuntien kauppa- ja kehityskonferenssi, joka tästälähin kutsutaan kokoon vähiintään kerran kolmessa vuodessa. Vuonna 1960 aloitetun "nälkä pois" kampanjan lisäksi on suunniteltu ns. maailman elintarvikeohjelma, jonka toteuttamista jäsenvaltioi avustavat. Suomi on osallistunut tähän ohjelmaan noin 2 miljoonalla dollarilla. Kehitys- puohjelmiin kuuluvat myös teknillisen avun ohjelma, jonka palveluksessa on tällä hetkellä ympäri maailman yli 13 000 miesta ja naista, sekä YK:n erityisrahasto, joka auttaa alikehittyneitä maita luomaan perusedellytykset taloudelliselle kasvulle.

Vuonna 1963 on YK:n aseellisia joukkoja lähetty asianomaisten hallitusten pyynnöstä Malesiaan, Jemeniin ja Vietnamiin samalla kun aikaisemmat yksiköt, joiden päämaja on Jerusalemissa, ja YK:n valvontajoukko Gazassa sekä sotilaalliseen huomioitsijat Kashmirissa jatkoivat työtään entiseen tapaansa.

YK:n laajalla työsaralla merkitsevät edellämainitut vain tärkeimpätko kohteita. Huomattavaa laajemista on YK:n ja sen erityisjärjestöjen toiminnassa tapahtunut ja toiveikkain mielin voidaan suhtautua maailmanjärjestön tulevaisuuteen.


